# ORGANIZATION OVERVIEW

## ABOUT SILENCE THE SHAME

Silence the Shame (STS), Inc. is a national non-profit organization dedicated to eliminating mental health stigma and reducing health disparities and suicide rates among high-stress populations. Through community conversations, compelling content, and culturally responsive programs, we aim to normalize the conversation, peel back the layers of shame, and promote mental wellness.

## MISSION

Empower and educate communities on mental health and wellness.

# PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The **Silence the Shame University (STSU) College Ambassador Program** is an innovative leadership initiative that equips college students, especially those from underrepresented backgrounds, to become proactive mental health advocates on their campuses and in their communities.

Through the six-month **CLIMB UP Ambassador Leadership Training**, participants engage in self-paced learning, cohort-based workshops, and community engagement projects that build emotional intelligence, coping skills, and advocacy competencies. Ambassadors receive financial and transportation support to fully participate, and, upon completion, lead awareness campaigns, foster peer support networks, and connect students to behavioral health resources.

By increasing mental health literacy, reducing stigma, and cultivating youth leaders, STSU is helping to create more informed, resilient, and mentally well college communities.

## STSU COHORT OUTREACH PROJECTS



### “Mind Over Matter” Cope Activity

Saturday, April 5, 2025 | Moving In The Spirit, Atlanta, GA

This event engaged 11 youth and 2 volunteers to promote mental health awareness and well-being. Highlights included a mental health obstacle course and self-care activities such as mindful movement, a letting go challenge, and mirror affirmations. The event concluded with a discussion led by a STSU Ambassador on personal reflections and future self-care practices for managing mental health challenges. ### “Cope & Connect” COPE Activity

Saturday, April 12, 2025 | Atlanta Glow, Atlanta, GA

This event engaged 10 youth participants and 3 volunteers in mental health awareness, aiming to reduce stigma and offer well-being strategies. Highlights included self-care activities like making glitter jars and stress balls, and a panel discussion on managing social anxiety. ### Free Your Feels Self-Care Social

Monday, April 14, 2025 | Morehouse College, Atlanta, GA

This event engaged 40 college students. The event aimed to empower participants by providing accessible stress relief and mindfulness techniques in a supportive environment. Highlights included four wellness stations focused on mental and emotional well-being, featuring activities like creating personal tea blends, coloring mandalas, practicing yoga, and journaling with reflective affirmations. The "Thriving Not Surviving" initiative engaged 20 college students and 4 volunteers to promote mental health awareness and reduce stigma. It offered educational resources, community support, and open discussions to normalize mental health conversations and strengthen campus support. The event featured a panel with Edomonia Doe (LPT), Krishna Louis (Master of Physician Assistant Studies), and Jamarrea Anderson (STSU Ambassador), and included a moderated discussion on managing mental health in college, along with a Q&A session. 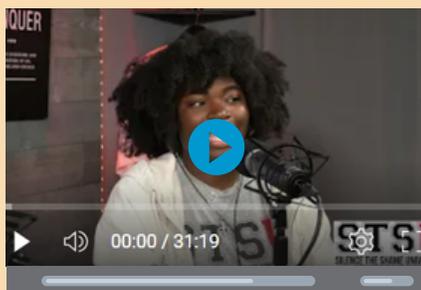

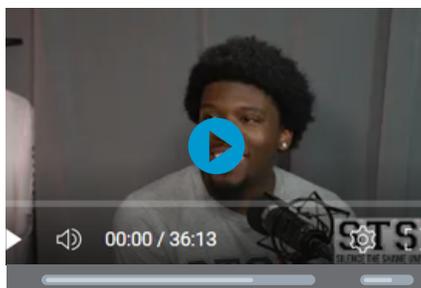
### Part 1:

### **Mind Matters Behavioral Health Conversation & Care**

STS hosted the Mind Matters Conversation & Care at Morehouse College, engaging 65 attendees in discussions on mental health, resilience, and available support resources. ### **Vision Board Party**

STS hosted a Self-Care Social in partnership with Tia Robinson, engaging 12 participants and supported by 2 volunteers in a welcoming, creative environment designed to promote relaxation, reflection, and goal-setting for the upcoming semester and year. **[Click here or the image for Recap video](#)**

STS hosted a Self-Care Social at Lucky Strike, engaging 7 Ambassadors in a shared self-care experience designed to strengthen peer connections, build community, and promote balance through recreational wellness activities and academic pressures.

## STUDENT-LED COMMUNITY SERVICE PROJECT



### **Positivity Letters**

The Positivity Letters initiative was a student-led community service activity in which Ambassadors and students wrote encouraging, affirming letters to youth in high school facing isolation or hardship. The goal was to spread hope, kindness, and emotional support while reinforcing the importance of empathy and connection. The activity helped students practice compassion, reflective listening, and purposeful service, strengthening their role as mental health advocates and community leaders.

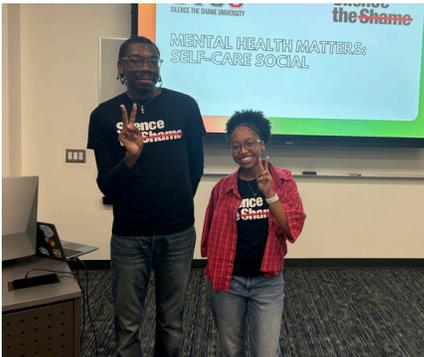
### ABPsi Community Conversation

STSU partnered with Morehouse College's ABPsi chapter to host a Community Conversation for 29 participants. The panel centered on the importance of role models and mentorship for young Black men. The event was planned and facilitated by a STSU Ambassador, with cohort members supporting a resource table, where students received information on 988 crisis support, Black men's mental health resources, and educational materials on anxiety and depression—strengthening awareness, help-seeking, and community support.



### Disconnect to Connect Self-care Social

A STSU Ambassador partnered with the Alpha Kappa Delta Sociology Honors Society to host a Self-Care Social at Kennesaw State University, providing students with a supportive space to decompress during finals and prioritize their mental well-being. The event engaged 29 students through guided breathing exercises, dog therapy, journaling, adult coloring, positivity letter writing, and access to mental health resources, with four cohort members supporting on-site resource sharing.



### GSU Public Health Club Self-Care Social

Two STSU Ambassadors facilitated a Self-Care Social for the GSU Public Health Club during Public Health Week, introducing participants to STS programs and resources. The interactive session engaged 10 students in creating affirmation mirrors, writing positivity letters, and learning about mental health and wellness resources, empowering participants to strengthen their self-awareness, practice self-care, and support their overall well-being.



### Future Seekers COPE Clinic

Four STSU Ambassadors partnered with the Future Seekers Afterschool program to host a self-love and wellness event for 45 teens. The event emphasized that a healthy life starts with caring for oneself, through a teen-led panel and four interactive stations on journaling, affirmation mirrors, nutrition education, and team building. It concluded with guided reflection to help youth process their learning and set personal intentions.

# PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

## FRESHMAN HANGOUTS



STS partnered with T2S C.A.R.E.S. to launch Freshman Hangouts, designed to promote mental health awareness and peer support across Georgia State University, Georgia Tech, and the AUC. Lead Ambassadors were trained through T2S C.A.R.E.S.' LEAF peer support program to facilitate safe, supportive spaces where students built connections, learned self-care and coping skills, reinforced peer networks that encourage help-seeking and stress management, and supported student-led mental health efforts that normalized conversations about emotional well-being across campuses, engaging over 331 students, including 104 freshmen.

## 988 HBCU TOUR

STS partnered with DBHDD 988 team to deepen relationships with campus counseling centers, empower student advocates, and amplify awareness of 988 as a life-saving mental health resource across Georgia's HBCU community, engaging over 1,600 students and community members through this initiative, with Ambassadors supporting the effort by creating an interactive 988 trivia game and tabling at several events. Each school received customized 988 materials, including shirts in their campus colors, HBCU-edition posters and STSU College Resources Postcards designed to promote essential mental health practices and support the overall well-being of college students.

The STSU College Empowerment Fest delivered an impactful and transformative experience, placing student empowerment at its core. The event was built around three essential pillars: Career Readiness through Silence the Shame University (STSU), Mental Health Awareness through Free Your Feels (FYF), and Suicide Prevention with My Life is a Gift (MLG). During the event, we offered hands-on wellness activities and live music to promote relaxation, connection, and positive energy. Students also connected with community and campus resources that offered ongoing mental health support. Students engaged in a Fireside Chat with CEO, Shanti Das, and comedian DC Young Fly, empowering youth to be authentic with self-care and focused on goals that can often change pathways through their lives.
